Fabric Kits for Lutheran World Relief

distribution
worldwide. The fab-

ric kits are used to teach men and women how to sew. Once learned, they can use their knowledge of sewing to earn income from sewing and selling their product or from launching a tailor business. The fabric kits include two pieces of new fabric with matching or neutral-colored thread. The following fabric sizes are required:

- 60 inch wide 2 1/4 yard
- 44 inch wide 3 yards
- 36 inch wide 4 yards
- General purpose spools of thread –
 250-300 yards each

As you clean you sewing areas, donations are appreciated of new fabric and/or colored or neutral thread you won't be using. The items can be dropped off in the church office. A Thrivent Grant is being used to purchase thread and fabric to match any donated items.

The Sewing Bee ladies take donations of any fabric and thread for use in making Mission Quilts. If you find these items that you won't use, donation would be appreciated, too.



Our Church History:



The set of four windows in the cove at the front of our church were dedicated as the choir windows. When the church was first built there was no fireside room and no choir loft. The choir sang from this little offset part of the sanctuary. All four of these windows have a musical theme and were given as the following memorials and gifts:

- by Mrs. Bernard E. Blomquist and family in memory of Bernard E. Blomquist
- by friends and family in memory of Mrs. Christine Wickman
- by Mrs. W.B. Thompson (dated May, 1962)
- in memory of Mrs. Marjorie Johnson

and granddaughters
Barbara and Margaret
in memory of Mr. and
Mrs. John Junell

The first window features a harp. Within the harp is a staurogram or a Tau-Rho cross, this was an early depiction for Jesus on the cross. Also within this window are two stars of heaven, one to symbolize day and one to symbolize night.



The next window features an organ, so particularly important to our worship. The depiction of the organ in this window – with the red flares coming from the sides - is meant to symbolize God's energy and power emitting from the instrument.

The third window in this group is the golden trumpet window. In the middle is featured a labarum, also known as the Chi-Rho Christ symbol, with the alpha and omega on each side. The Chi-Rho started in the early church as visual representation of the connection between the crucifixion of Jesus and his resurrection. Alpha and omega are the first and last letters of the Greek alpha-



bet, and they are referenced several times in the bible including Revelation 1:8, "I am the Alpha and the Omega." In this window, it is



almost as if the trumpets are helping us to proclaim, "God is all – the beginning and the end."

Finally in this group is the singing bird window. Here, the birds are symbols of all creation singing their glory to God. The musical notes depicted in this window are the first line of "A Mighty Fortress is Our God."



Pastor's Link

"Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of mercies and God of all comfort, who comforts us in all our affliction, so that we may be able to comfort those who are in any affliction, with the comfort with which we ourselves are comforted by God. For as we share abundantly in Christ's sufferings, so through Christ we share abundantly in comfort too. If we are afflicted, it is for your comfort and salvation; and if we are comforted, it is for your comfort, which you experience when you patiently endure the same sufferings that we suffer. Our hope for you is unshaken, for we know that as you share in our sufferings, you will also share in our comfort."

2 Corinthians 1:3-7

Have you ever felt in need of comfort? The burdens of living in this sin-filled world continuously wear upon us. The attacks of Satan are relentless, as he seeks to rob us of our joy of living in the true faith and life in Jesus. The world is growing in its assaults against truth, and we are witnessing the increase of the world calling evil good, and good evil.

I recently read the following: "Whether you hurt physically, spiritually or emotionally, your suffering will find its meaning in Christ's suffering. Of course, our affliction doesn't pay for anyone's sins, much less our own, that is what Jesus did for us on the cross." As the Apostle Paul states; "For our sake God made Him to be sin who knew no sin, so that **in Him** we might become the righteousness of God".

Your private pain finds meaning in the collective experience of all of Christ's beloved. Our pain moves us from a place of sympathy, to empathy. Paul, in writing about the suffering he encountered in his ministry, saw affliction as the norm for all Christians. He saw his personal problems as mysteriously linked with the whole church and the afflictions of Jesus: "Now I rejoice in my sufferings for your sake, and in my flesh I am filling up what is lacking in Christ's afflictions for the sake of his body, that is, the church". That is the secret to maintaining an even keel in stormtossed situations and to finding persistent hope in the midst of our suffering; seeing our affliction as our personal link to Jesus; because he is "a man of sorrows and acquainted with grief", Therefore we can be sure we are not alone in our suffering. Jesus is there with us, because He bore our misery ahead of us and experienced it in a human body just like ours, our pain is sanctified in His. Emotional or physical distress can be endured not because we have sufficient grit and determination to push through it on our own, but because He is alongside us. We have a real flesh and blood Savior! He knows what He's saying when He invites us to come to Him with our worries and burdens: "Come to me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me, for I am gentle and lowly in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light". Jesus truly knows what we are going through. Remember, He became a man for the sole purpose saving us from sin and death by being our substitute under the Law and under God's justice. In the Garden of

Gethsemane, with the realization of the horrors of the full suffering before Him, Jesus prayed to the Father to remove that bitter cup of suffering if there was another way to save us. There was not. He was fully human, including feeling fear and anxiousness for what awaited Him. Yet He surrendered and suffered with complete trust in the Father, praying "not as I will, but as You will". He would suffer all in our place that we may be saved from the true eternal suffering that justly awaited us. His suffering, His trust, His payment has been made yours, and by it we are forgiven all our sins and guilt, and by trusting in that saving work you are saved from suffering that you cannot begin to imagine. Jesus knows suffering and sorrow. He knows YOUR suffering and sorrow. And He is with you as you endure it, and not without sympathy. Christians don't need to pretend that tragedies never happen or suffering isn't miserable or pain doesn't hurt. We can afford to be honest with God, because He knows the depth of human suffering. We can confidently cry out to him from the bottom of our anxious hearts, knowing we have a Father in heaven who shows compassion to His children. We have a Savior who wept at the grave of his dear friend Lazarus, and when we're at a loss for words, the Holy Spirit takes over, interceding for us with sighs too deep for words. God tenderly invites our prayers, promising His attentive ear: "Call upon me in the day of trouble; I will deliver you, and you shall glorify me". Indeed, you are not alone. Cry out unto your Lord. In times of fear or anxiousness, times of worry, find a

quiet place, open up your Bible, and read out loud to yourself from this Word of Life. Read that Word as if it was written for you...because it was! And use that Word to move you to prayer and action. Cry out to Him and know that He hears you, is with you and will uphold you. The Comforter will comfort you and give you

His Peace. In Christ's Name, Pastor Paul



Return to Coffee Hour Fellowship!


