Bellin Health Reminder

With rising Covid-19 numbers and area hospitals nearing capacity in many parts of Wisconsin and the Upper Peninsula of Michigan, we wanted to remind you about things you can do to help slow the spread of the virus.

To slow the spread of this virus and protect yourself and those around you, it is critical for everyone to follow the CDC guidelines for prevention.

- Wash your hands frequently with soap and warm water for 20 seconds.
- If you can't wash your hands, use a hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol.
- When you have to leave home, maintain at least six feet of distance—about two adult arm's lengths—between you and others.
- Avoid unnecessary travel and check CDC travel recommendations before planning a trip.
- Use a household wipe or spray to disinfect doorknobs, lights switches, desks, sinks, and other objects and surfaces that are frequently touched.

Most importantly, wear a mask in public to help protect you and others from respiratory droplets.



The Pad Project

Some time ago our church sewing group received a letter from a high school graduate who had been involved in a sewing ministry called the "Pad Project". She writes "my involvement with the Pad Project has been so rewarding and eye-opening that I hope to see its growth continue. I searched for churches with a sewing ministry to spread the word and raise awareness for this project and came across Our Saviour's website and noticed that your sewing group makes items to distribute all around the globe in service to the Lord. I hope that you would consider adding this project to your sewing ministries".

The Pad Project makes washable, reusable maxi pads for girls and women in thirdworld countries who have limited or no access to feminine hygiene supplies. Each pad consists of two layers, one of a soft flannel and the other a waterproof layer. Elastic at each end hold a layer of fleece or terrycloth that can be removed and washed. Each girl receives 2 "pads" along with underwear to use them with.

Thanks to a Thrivent Financial grant of \$250 the necessary supplies were assembled the beginning of this year and all that was needed was the time to cut and sew the pads. Along came the pandemic to provide just that....lots and lots of additional time.

This past month two boxes of pads with enough provisions for 86 young ladies were shipped to a missionary in Virginia who will be traveling to Kenya in November to distribute them. Pastor Paul added a special blessing and we send along our prayers for each recipient.

Light at the Inn Shelter is a 501-c-3, non-profit mission outreach to the homeless of Dickinson and Iron counties. We have provided emergency shelter and meals to over 125 individuals over the last four winters. Each year more and more seek shelter and assistance. Some have stayed only a few nights but others had nowhere else to go and remained at the shelter throughout the winter. Considering the economic challenges of this particular up-coming season, we have good reason to anticipate a larger than usual need for emergency housing.

COVID-19 mandates and health issues have required that we change our face-to-face operations for this upcoming season which begins on November 1st and runs through the end of March, 2021. It is important to us and critical to our homeless guests that we maintain some type of emergency housing assistance in our area. Currently, a homeless person or family that is seeking help with emergency housing, contacts the Community Action Agency who then begins the application process of state assisted housing.

After Community Action business hours, in an immediate need, **Light at the Inn Shelter** will be able to assist in our local area. While we cannot provide the shelter that we have in the past, we will be able to provide emergency placement for that night

and instructions for contacting Community Action on the next business day.

There may be those who don't qualify for established program assistance and in those situations, **LATI** will seek to provide further assistance for more permanent placement in another area where there are operating shelters.

In addition, **Light at the Inn** can provide basic information for other community agencies and churches that have food pantries, community meals, clothing and counseling. In the past, **Light at the Inn** has not been able to assist families with children, but this new policy will enable us to help these families as well to obtain emergency shelter.

This new way of operating is going to be more expensive for the **Light at the Inn** organization. We are trusting in the on-going support of this generous community to help us to help those who are experiencing homelessness. In the UP, in the winter... emergency services of this kind can save lives!

After hours or on weekends and holidays call, <u>Light at the Inn Shelter Agency, at 1-906-282-5860</u> and a Light at the Inn volunteer will assist you with the resources available to us.

Pastor's Link

Beware, a thief is stalking us. With calculated malice and murderous intentions, he wants to rob us of our most valuable possession, our faith. You would think that with the increased awareness of personal security that we would be more on guard against the first and greatest of all thieves, the devil. With smooth subtlety and twisted lies, the devil sweet-talked and deceived our first parents into sin, robbing us of everything we had as those created in God's image. This thief literally robbed us blind; because with our rebellion we became spiritually blinded, our souls were murdered with a spiritual death. All this to be followed by the slow, agonizing, life-long process being bound to time and a body of death and decay. We were awaiting the horrors of eternal death and an eternal hell, where we would be forever robbed of God's presence - all hope, relief, comfort and joy taken forever.

But then God gave us back what was stolen by means of the death and resurrection of His Son, Jesus Christ, the Messiah. Jesus. Who accomplished the forgiveness of our sin and guilt that had separated us from our Lord and restored the true Life of the Holy Spirit back into us. Though Jesus beat him, the Thief would not surrender.

For years the devil has continued to work through false teachers to twist the Good News of the Gospel of Christ, robbing Christians of the hope and comfort God would have His people enjoy. Eventually, the Gospel was all but lost, buried under the false teachings a church that would have people look to their good works for salvation and when that failed, to rely upon another lie of the devil called indulgences. There the Christian could buy "hope" and "comfort" and escape at least some of the sufferings of purgatory (which does not exist). What lies and cheap substitutes for the Gospel of Salvation by Grace alone through faith alone in Christ alone! These lies further robbed the child of God of the true comfort God would have them enjoy in Christ.



Reformation

As we remember and celebrate the Reformation this month, we give thanks unto God that through men like Martin Luther and the other reformers; we enjoy the recovery of the most sacred object, namely the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Once again we hear the Truth of God's love for us in Christ Jesus by His Means of Grace Alone delivered to God's people through Baptism and Holy Communion.

But the Thief would not rest, and the Gospel is still at risk. Later the devil tried to steal the gospel again through pietism. This false teaching tells us to look inwardly to our own hearts, deeds, and feelings for assurance and certainty of salvation. The Christian was told that only by their faithfulness and holy living could they be sure of their salvation. Hope and comfort were stolen again. The devil has always worked at getting people to deny the Word of God, to get them to no longer trust in Jesus deeds, His Word and His Promises alone, but instead to trust in themselves or their own philosophies and ideas.

The Thief has continued that work today in our own country, as Lutherans have constantly had to struggle to keep the gospel pure, preserved from the thieves of worksrighteousness and legalistic false-piety, as well as the "prosperity gospel". These are all thieves that would rob us of the comfort, hope and assurance that God the Father would have His children enjoy.

For almost one hundred years, God has preserved His Gospel among His children gathered here at Our Saviour's Lutheran Church. Here God has continued to visit His people in the Gospel proclaimed, and in the sacraments offered. Here God has helped His children battle the great Thief who would desire nothing more but to get us to look at ourselves and trust in our own righteousness, sadly despairing in our failure and sin. Our Father has helped in that He has continued to have His pure Gospel proclaimed and in that Word He has equipped

us to do battle with the dark spiritual powers that seek to destroy us. In the words of Martin Luther:

"Though devils all the world should fill, all eager to devour us, we tremble not, we fear no ill; They shall not overpower us.
This world's prince may still scowl fierce as he will, He can harm us none.
He's judged; the deed is done; one little word can fell him."
That Word? Jesus.
