

In this month's Church History

section of The Carillon, we are continuing our series on the history and meaning of our church's stained-glass windows. The next two windows can be found on the west side of the church approximately halfway between the front and back of the nave (the part of the church where the pews are located.)



The Creation Window was given as a memorial in honor of Esther Turner. It depicts the Eye of Providence or allseeing eye of God. This symbol is meant to remind us that His vision encompasses and watches over all of His creation in every direction. The eye is set within the sixpointed star, the Star of Creation or Star of David. While it is usually associated with

the Jewish faith, the use of this symbol dates back as an important symbol in the early Christian church as well. The six points represent the six days of creation. Finally, and similar to other windows in our church, the rays of light emitting from around the Star of Creation are symbolic of God's glory.

The next window, the Fall of Man Window, was given as a memorial in honor of Raymond Turner. It does not need much explaining. Depicted here is Genesis 3:1-7, the fall of man into sin. Satan is the personification of evil in the form of the snake. The

hand represents Eve or Adam – or us – and is reaching for the forbidden fruit.

Invite your friends and come for the weekend. You'll be rejuvenated and grow more deeply rooted in all the best ways.




Pastor's Link

With the approaching of the 4th of July, we of course celebrate the hard won freedom we have inherited as United States Citizens. We are a nation and a people that absolutely focus on the importance of living in freedom. However, what we fail to often remember is that we in fact are all born in a form of slavery; slavery to sin and death. Man is never "free" apart from living life in God's Holy Spirit. We will always serve something - and apart from God and His grace, that will be a service to our sinful nature and Satan. By our corrupted and ruined nature we are in bondage to sin and cannot free ourselves. We can do no other. period. But having by the gracious work of our Lord Jesus Christ upon the Cross and empty tomb, given to us through the faith God the Holy Spirit created in us through the Word, we have been freed from slavery to our sinful nature and the power of Satan. Now we can in Christ by the power of the Holy Spirit be forgiven when we fail to resist, and instead we can live in freedom from condemnation and guilt, and live the life we were created to live, in loving service to God and neighbor. This freedom in Christ is one that also carries responsibility. We are not to use our freedom to the harm of others. Though there is no condemnation for those in Christ Jesus, and we are free in Him from having to keep the Law perfectly for salvation (which can never be done of course), and we do not have to worry about

following certain rules or practices to secure our salvation, we are not free to live any way we want which usually involves caving to the selfish desires of the Old Adam. We are free to love and serve each other with a Godly, sacrificial attitude as we have first been served by our Lord. As Paul reminds us: "For you were called to freedom, brothers and sisters. Only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for the flesh, but through love to serve one another." Not only can we rejoice in the heritage we have as a free people in this country, we can be reminded this Fourth of July of the Grace and forgiveness of God given to us through the cross and the Means of Grace, found in baptism and Holy Communion. We can also live in the true freedom we have in Christ, loving our neighbors as ourselves. In such love we will be conscious of the weakness of others, and be able to forgive them. Our Freedom in Christ gives us a sacrificial heart, to live lives that build each other up, rather than tear down or destroy. In Christ, we are truly free indeed. Happy Fourth of July!


