God Club



With the new year came a new set of God Club lessons, based on our library's What's in the Bible

DVD series. Phil Vischer, creator of the longtime popular Veggie Tales, and a bunch of hilarious new (mostly puppet) friends will eventually take us through the whole Bible in a fast-paced fun-filled way. Each DVD has two 25-minute episodes, so each will take two weeks for us to complete.

We started with *In The Beginning*... In our first lesson we learned that with 783,137 words, 1,189 chapters, and 66 books of the Holy Scripture, the message of the Bible can be summarized in one sentence – with 25 short words...

"For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish, but have eternal life." John 3:16

That's it--the Gospel message in a nutshell. We created laminated bookmarks, listing all of the books of the Bible and a John 3:16 cross.

On the second Wednesday in January we read, prayed and crafted about God's wonderful creation. We had a blast reading Noah's story, complete with crazy sound effects and then we cut out and put together a hanging dove carrying a branch for Noah.

Next came the Let My People Go DVD...
Our first lesson centered on Abraham's faith in nearly sacrificing his precious son, Isaac.
We made adorable Trusty Rusty sheep pillows to help us remember that we should always trust that God will provide.

On our final January meeting, we read about Moses and the burning bush. We crafted our own burning prayer bushes with stemmed glasses, fire-colored tissue paper, and battery candles. Our DVD and flash-cards talked about such words as Salvation, Sin, Exodus, Pharaoh, and Tabernacle.

February will find the God Club kids continuing with the What's in the Bible, but taking breaks to make Valentines for Veterans and whatever else Miss Joy has in mind.

Please know that we always have room for more students, grades 2-5, each Wednesday in the Creation Station classroom, after school until 5:00pm. Come and gather together to learn about, practice, and celebrate God's love – and bring your friends too!

Our three-four year old Preschool Class worked on number recognition during the month of January. Each day we had a craft that involved counting or one to one correspondence. We counted the letters in our names, made a mitten with snowflakes and counted the snow flakes, and counted beads to make a snowflake necklace. Our Bible stories were Jesus Brings a Dead Girl Back to Life, Jesus Feeds 5,000 People, Jesus Teaches Peter to Trust, and The Good Samaritan Helps a Hurt Man.

The Prekindergarten Class learned about Arctic animals, penguins and polar bears and how they live and survive in cold climates. We watched videos, read about, and made projects for each animal. We also completed a unit on measurement. The kids learned about height, length, weight and capacity. We measured the height and length of various objects using nonstandard units of measurement. We even drew penguins and measured how tall they were using marshmallows! The students also took turns measuring each other to find out how many building blocks tall they were. Our Bible lessons were about Moses and we learned how God helped and provided for him and His people all of the time. Our stories included. God all of the time. Our stories included. Feb. 4th - To Move, To Touch, To Heal In Mark 1:20-39, Jesus tells his disciples that he is supposed to proclaim the message. But the Rev. David Hodges says that proclaiming the message means not just telling people what the kingdom of God is, but showing them--by reaching out and touching people who, because of their disease, their behavior, or their demons, were suffering.

Feb. 11th - The Happiest Place on Earth

In his sermon for Transfiguration Sunday, the Rev. Cuttino Alexander explains that the word "transfiguration" means to elevate something and make it more beautiful, make it shine. And that's what happened on the mountaintop with Jesus, and Peter, James, and John. But after those moments in life we're back at the bottom of the mountain, smack dab in real life.

Feb. 18th - He Was With the Wild Beasts

In his sermon for the first Sunday in Lent, the Rev. Gordon Stuart says Mark's account of Jesus' wilderness retreat simply says Jesus 'was with the wild beasts, and angels ministered to him.' We can draw both comfort and challenge from that, because we all face times when the beasts of life are all too real, when faith falters, when despair gnaws at us, and hopelessness nearly destroys our sense of well being.

Pastors Link



Lent looms ahead of us as a time to turn away from things that do not bring life and to turn to Jesus Christ as we anticipate the Passion Week, the death of Christ on the cross and ultimately his rising from the grave on Easter Sunday. So with Martin Luther we ask; "What does it mean?"

Many Lutheran theologians regard Luther's "The Bondage of the Will" as his most important work. In this writing, Luther is sponding to assertions that support our natural moral ability to 'obey' the gospel and 'choose' Jesus. Many fundamentalists believe that all of God's commands to obey go to prove that we have the "free-will" to do so. Luther, in "The Bondage of the Will" exposes the accepted concept of 'free will' as an erroneous, unscriptural doctrine which ultimately undermines the gospel itself, and puts the attainment of salvation on the works of humans instead of solely on the grace of God, through the cross of Christ. Luther in this treatise hits the core of the issue: whether grace alone saves, or whether salvation is a mixture of a human's ability to choose their salvation, along with little sprinklings of grace. This is still extremely relevant for today's Christian, for many carry the unbiblical assumption which concludes that any command from God to believe or obey the gospel somehow implies the moral ability of human beings to do so (see: Noah).

Large numbers of evangelicals today make this same jump in logic and build a whole theology on it; assuming that God's commands somehow automatically implies that we have the moral ability to do it. This belief includes ironically, many Lutherans, but as Dr. Luther said, "When you are finished with all your commands and exhortations, I will write over the top of it all. "By grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not a work of your own, lest anyone boast." In other words, the commands of God exist to show what we cannot do rather than what we can do; this includes God's command of all people everywhere to repent and believe the gospel, an impossible act of will apart from the supernatural work of the Holy Spirit uniting us to Christ through Word and sacrament. Only the grace of lesus Christ applied by the Spirit can illumine the scripture in such a way as to open blind eyes and deaf ears. By this work of the Spirit we are able to see Christ's absolute, unconditional free gift of salvation through His cross and resurrection. Those who cannot yet see Christ's gift are wholly dependent on God to translate them from darkness to light. It is as if we were to come across a non-swimmer who was drowning and shout to him; "You MUST swim!" He cannot.

The irony of this comparison is the fact that if a person who is drowning can totally relax themselves, meaning giving up the struggle completely; they will naturally float. Our struggle with our human nature and the idea that we have the power to control it, apart from the Spirit of God, is what sinks us. We can try to be good, but we can't. We try to believe, but apart from the Spirit we cannot.

And the person who tells us that we must be good, do good and 'choose' God is pouring a bucket of cold water on a drowning man. To "Let go, and let God" is to surrender our earthly human efforts to save ourselves. To realize that salvation is God's work, and God's work alone through Jesus Christ, is to surrender the struggle and in doing so, to float.

In Martin Luther's explanation of the Third Article of the Apostle's Creed, he states; "I believe that I cannot by my own reason or strength believe in Jesus Christ, my Lord or come to Him; but the Holy Spirit has called me by the Gospel, enlightened me with His gifts, sanctified and kept me in the true faith." i.e. we cannot do it...but God can... and does.

Our surrender to God must be unconditional. We cannot 'choose' to believe or to follow Christ, this is the gift and work of the Holy Spirit. Any belief system that hold's that Jesus Christ would turn his back on anyone...leper, prostitute, tax collector...a-n-y-o-n-e...is false. "I believe, that I cannot believe", and in that surrender of our human pride, the Spirit enters in.
