

Hi everybody! I just thought I would check in and let you know how I am doing! Since my



last article seemed to help people understand me better, I figured I would write another one! Life is going very well for me, as I continue to adapt to my new environments. Dad is not as enthused about my new habit of making "peanut butter wall paintings" in my room, but he will adapt, I am sure.

I am still enjoying my favorite 10:45am service on Sundays and I appreciate your patience with me. I can see that sometimes people feel awkward when they're around me; please don't. There is nothing you can say or do that will hurt my feelings (unless you try to take my cookies away...lol). I may need to be treated with a little more patience, but please do not be afraid of me.

Here are a couple of things that I want to share with you this month. People sometimes think that because of some of the shared traits that we have, that all folks with autism are the same. For example; in general we do not like to make direct eye contact with other people. One person with autism described it this way; "The eyes hold too much information to process". Please don't think that we do not care, or want to avoid you just because we avoid eye contact. We love people and we need to be loved in return. There are wonderful and enormous joys and a lot of laughter to those who make the effort to love us! Knowing one child with autism doesn't mean you know all of us, we are all so different in so many ways! People with special needs are smart, talented, creative and thoughtful. It may not be obvious all the time – because our minds work differently.

On another note, if I am making strange noises, feel free to look. I am usually doing this because I am excited. My parents are not offended by people looking, just please don't judge me for my "quirks". If you see me doing strange things, it is usually because I am anxious. My parents will not scold me, because that just makes it much worse, so please do not look at them as if they should. I can't help how my body and mind receive external stimuli. I am simply trying to cope with the way my mind and body are affected by my surroundings and by external input. To those who think my Mom and Dad are not addressing my odd behaviors, I ask for a little empathy for them. Please don't judge them. Try to understand that my environment strongly affects how I act and behave. Please accept me the way that I accept you...with God's unconditional love!

Keryx Weekend

Keryx is a Greek word meaning "herald". In the ancient world, a herald was one sent by his master to proclaim in public the master's message. He dared not change the announcement because it was not his own. His responsibility was only to proclaim it accurately. That is how Paul understood his gospel ministry. We, in Keryx, as Paul are mere servants proclaiming our Master's Good News.

Bruce Buckman & Jim Meier are on team for Keryx #49, April 19th - April 22nd at Marquette Branch Prison. They are requesting support from our Ultreya and Emmaus 4th Day communities in the form of palanca/agape, treats, prayer vigil participation, and even an opportunity for a group apostolic endeavor. Please review the important palanca/agape instructions below.

Palanca/Agape Instructions:

Please note that all agape/palanca must be written expressions on paper ONLY, and with NO stickers of any kind on them. Please address your letters, "Dear Brother in Christ", and write of your support and God's love for the candidates. Do not include any identifying information such as your last name, address, phone number, etc. Use only your first name - no exceptions.

All agape/palanca for each individual prisoner will be placed in one large envelope and mailed at the end of the weekend. Therefore, it is not necessary for you to put your letters in envelopes. All letters are read by our volunteers for acceptability and are screened again by Department of Corrections personnel after their arrival at the prison via U.S. Mail. There will be as many as 28 men attending the Keryx. Please drop off your letters by 9am on Thursday, April 19th at Our Saviour's. Thank you for taking the time to be a blessing and write to these men. Your notes are very powerful following the weekend and help to show Christ's love for them does not end after the weekend closing.

Treats:

Donations of home-baked treats are gratefully accepted for Keryx weekends. They would like to bring as many dozen treats as possible into the prison as a gift to the many corrections officers who go out of their way to allow them to come into the prison on these weekends. They bring in 300-350 dozen treats during the weekend. Please help them out by dropping off your home-baked treats (in disposable packaging please) by 9am on Thursday, April 19th at Our Saviour's.

Prayer Vigil:

Vigil begins at 2:00pm on Thursday, April 19th and runs through 3:00pm Sunday, April 22nd. They ask that you commit to at least I hour of prayer during this time. Please pray for the prison population, prison staff, Keryx candidates and the Keryx Team that will be at Marguette Branch Prison. You do not have to go anywhere to join this Prayer Vigil. Pray at home, at work, in your car or wherever you are at the time that you sign up to pray. Please ask your friends and family to pray too. Please submit your names, town, and time slot to Bruce Buckman via email at mail.buckman @charter.net. Only your first name and town will be written on the Prayer Vigil Poster and placed where the candidates can see and know that you are praying for them during their weekend. It is very powerful when the candidates see that many people on the outside are praying for them.

For over 20 years OSL and Kijitonyama Lutheran Church in Dar es Salaam, Tanzania, have shared in our faith and in our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. We encourage each other, share in our lives, love one another and hope in the life that is eternal with our Lord. There have been many trips both ways across the ocean and we have learned much about each other's cultures. We are in mission together spreading the Good News about Jesus Christ.

We are filled with joy that we have a group of 8 people (Pastor Paul, Nancy Buchcuski, Jan Buckman, Carol Christesen, Sally Karttunen, Doreen Olson, Loni Rochon & Terri Shoquist) from OSL traveling to Dar es Salaam, Tanzania this June! Our brothers and sisters at Kijitonyama Lutheran Church are so excited! Whenever we journey over to Tanzania we take boxes packed with donations. The pictures on the opposite page tell the story about our donations.

One picture, with Jan and Julieth, shows the suitcases and boxes that were taken over on our trip to Tanzania in 2016. One of the items we took over with us were the pillow-case dresses and boy's shorts, women in our church, Zion & First Lutheran made. Two of the pictures show young children being given the dresses and shorts (*at an orphanage*) and girls actually wearing the dresses (*at Fu-kayosi*). The girls and boys were so excited to receive the dresses and shorts! We will be taking more with us this trip.

There are two pictures depicting more items we will be taking with us. One picture shows beautiful quilts sewn by the ladies of our church. Another picture is of our Confirmation students and guides. For a service project our youth made tie blankets that will be distributed to an HIV/AIDS hospital we will be visiting in Tanzania. Our youth were awesome that night and they too are making a loving connection with our family in Tanza-



nia!

As that picture of suitcases and boxes shows, there are more than 2 checked bags per person when we go to Tanzania. We have to pay an overage fee and that adds up. Continuing with our **What's in the Bible** DVD series, we started March with Joshua leading the Israelites into the Promised Land. God encouraged Joshua to be strong and courageous... "for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go." Joshua then encouraged the people to be strong and brave. From Joshua 24:15, we made **"As** for me and my household, we will serve the Lord" wall/doorknob hangings.

The next week we read the story of Ruth and Naomi. Our Bible verse was Ruth 1:16. "But Ruth replied, "Don't urge me to leave you or to turn back from you. Where you go I will go, and where you stay I will stay. Your people will be my people and your God my God." We crafted pairs of little stand-up dogs with "Ruth 1:16" on their collars. Dogs are "man's best friend" and Ruth was Naomi's best friend. We prayed for God to help us to be loyal and true, like Ruth, and to think about the needs of others ~ rather than always about ourselves. We sang "They will know we are Christians by our Love."

On the Wednesday before Palm Sunday we read about Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem and we cheered and celebrated with loud "Hosannas and Hallelujahs!" We sang "This Is the Day that the Lord has Made" and we made "stained glass" palm leaf Hosanna window sun catchers.

On the Wednesday of Holy Week we opened four Easter eggs for discussion. The first had a cross, the second had three nails, the third, a stone (for the tomb), and the fourth was empty. We decorated our own empty Easter egg to remind us that Jesus' tomb was empty. He had risen, just as he said he would. We attached tags with Miss Joy's poem...



Oh, see my lovely Easter egg!
Study Closely, please, I beg.
Sweetly Colored by my hand,
Helping us to understand...
How special is our Saviour's love,
A gift that we're not worthy of.
The empty egg reminds us, too,
That Jesus died for me and you.

Finally, we sang **"Praise Ye the Lord"** and dyed 4 dozen boiled eggs for Our Saviour's Easter Fellowship.

Our BASIC kids have been enjoying "Drive Thru History," which brings us to many historical places we read about in the Bible. We have learned about persecution of early Christians in the Roman Empire and also had a lesson on Paul's travels around that whole area. A really neat thing happened when we were not able to meet in the Youth Room one Sunday (because of the wonderful new paint job in there!) Our kids met downstairs with the Sunday School kids and their lesson was about Paul on the "rocky road!" God is good, all the time!

Our room is looking super and we are enjoying a new air hockey table up there as well! We will take a short break for Easter/ spring break and resume April 15th. Join us then, we will be making more baby blankets to send to Tanzania. BASIC is for 6-8th grade and we meet in the Youth Room on Sundays, from 9:40-10:40.





April Ist - Get Up and Live

In his sermon for Easter Day, Dr. Chris Girata notes that at the tomb Mary Magdalene failed to see what was right in front of her--the risen Lord--and we can often be just like Mary. On this day we get a glimpse into a divine opportunity, the opportunity of Christ and the resurrection, which can enable us to actually live in this dark and scary world.

Our Lenten Journey is over and Palm Sunday has come and gone. Now we travel to the upper room on Maundy Thursday with Jesus and his disciples. We hear Jesus say those powerful words that are still effective when we hear them on Sunday mornings, "My Body, My blood, given and shed for you, and for all people, for the forgiveness of sins". We travel to the foot of the cross on Good Friday and hear Jesus utter a lonely cry of abandonment, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me"? We hear the words of finality that lesus spoke with his last breath, "It is finished." The price has been paid in full on the cross for our sin that sought to separate us from God.

And we will travel to the empty tomb on Easter Sunday morning to hear again about the group of women who went there early on the first day of the week to find it empty. We will hear once more the words of the angels at the empty tomb, "He is not here, but has risen"; the final, culmination on the Day of the Resurrection. We must always realize that Easter is more than just one day. Easter is an "every Sunday" celebration during which we come together to receive the forgiveness of the cross and the resurrection of Jesus-the forgiveness of sins and the certainty of eternal life with God. Easter is also an "every day" celebration in which we live each day trusting in God through Jesus Christ, knowing that lesus is "the resurrection and the life" for all of us.

So what do we do as we go forth from Easter Sunday? Let us follow the example of the women, the first witnesses of the empty tomb. After the two angels reminded Mary Magdalene and the other women that Jesus had risen, St. Luke tells us that; "They remembered the words, and returning from the tomb they told all these things to the eleven and to all the rest". They went forth from the tomb changed by the resurrection of Jesus. They went forth from the tomb to bring an "every day" witness of God's power over Sin, Death, Hell and the Devil, himself.

So where do we go once we leave the empty tomb? Let us also follow the example of Jesus' first disciples. After Jesus walked through locked doors to appear to the eleven disciples and to show himself to Thomas, seven of the eleven disciples went back to their fishing business. They went back to their vocations in life and took the witness of the resurrection with them. They lived in the joy of the resurrection of Jesus while carrying out the daily responsibilities of every day life. Just like the women at the empty tomb and the eleven disciples, we are to be "every day" witnesses and participants in the death and resurrection of Jesus. We were drowned in our baptism and we have risen to new life in Christ; and so we believe; and so we witness. We have the hope of eternal life and the joy of the resurrection living inside of us now.

Also, like the women at the empty tomb and the eleven disciples, we have vocations in life that God has given to us as an opportunity to witness to Christ's love and forgiveness. Most of us are not fishermen, but all of us have one or more of these callings: father, husband, mother, wife, son, daughter, brother, sister, grandparent, employee, coworker, retiree, friend and neighbor. Each of these callings comes with a set of duties and responsibilities. As Christians living by God's grace, we wrap the daily duties and responsibilities of our vocations in the joy, love, peace and forgiveness of Christ. And when we do this, others take notice and God will bless our faithful work by giving us opportunities to tell the story of His love. As we go forth from Easter Sunday, we go forth empowered by God's Spirit; living and active within us to live in the joy of the resurrection as "every day" witnesses to Jesus Christ.

May the God of second chances give us this opportunity again every single day. Amen.


